Children receive more one on one personal attention with an educator/kaiako and benefit from being part of a small group (no more than 4 children).

Home based education fits in with what you want for your child. You choose an educator/kaiako who matches your child's needs, your family/whānau values and the hours of care you require.

Our team of educators/nga kaiako offer a range of skills, experience, interests and expertise. Educators/nga kaiako are required to meet all Ministry of Education regulations and are individually police vetted, referee checked and hold a First Aid Certificate.

How to enrol

We encourage all families/whānau to contact the home based education team who will discuss your requirements and match you with relevant educators/nga kaiako.

You will then have the opportunity to meet with the educators/nga kaiako and get a real feel for them and their environment.

We understand you want the very best for your child and that you need to know your child is in a happy, fun, caring and safe environment.

Our educators/nga kaiako are truly passionate about what they do, love meeting new family/whānau and showing what we are all about.

We believe in building a relationship not only with your child but with your family/whānau, as together we are all invested in the education and care of your child.


What to do

- Step 1** Contact the home based education team on 0800 250 052 extn 3 or homebased@ikindergartens.nz and discuss your requirements.
- Step 2** Visit educators/nga kaiako.
- Step 3** Select an educator/kaiako and complete an enrolment form. The form contains essential information about your child. You can either complete this onsite or take the form home. The team will discuss your needs, talk about when a space is available and answer any queries you have.
- Step 5** The team will stay in contact with you and arrange a suitable start date.

Please be aware in some instances you may need to wait until there is space with your preferred educator/kaiako. Because children continually transition to kindergarten or school or sometimes move, vacancies do arise regularly.

By law, all early childhood education providers are required to keep an immunisation register. Please give a copy of your child's immunisation certificate and birth certificate to the home based team. The team will discuss this with you during the enrolment process.





Our learning programmes are based on New Zealand Early Childhood Curriculum; Te Whāriki which is “underpinned by a vision for children who are competent and confident learners and communicators, healthy in mind, body and spirit, secure in their sense of belonging and in the knowledge that they make a valued contribution to society.”

What your child will learn

Children attending Inspired Kindergartens Home Based Education will build strong foundations for ongoing learning.

They will develop:

- Ways to learn
- Wonderment and awe
- A connection with nature
- Social skills and the ability to work with and alongside others
- Independence
- Perseverance and persistence
- Early literacy skills, mathematic skills and problem solving skills
- Physical skills and spatial awareness
- An understanding of Māori culture and language.



As your child nears the age of transition (to either kindergarten or school), we will assist them during this process and the new challenges this brings. We aim to make this process simple and seamless.

Settling in

Starting home based education is a big step for your child, and it can also be a big step for your family/whānau. Your little one is growing up and becoming an independent and confident individual.

Here are a few simple steps to help:

1. Visits

Before your child's official start date, it is a good idea to do a couple of visits to familiarise both yourself and your child with the educator's/kaiako home environment. The educator/kaiako will welcome you and show you around, explain their routines and what you can expect.

Your child may wish to watch, or they may be keen to join an activity straight away. Let your child get a sense for the new surroundings and go at their pace as they feel comfortable.

2. Talk about their educator/kaiako

Before starting, talk to your child about their educator/kaiako, the activities they will do, the environment and their new friends. This helps children get used to the idea of spending time away from home and away from you.



First few days

Many children love their first day and sometimes their first week, as it is so new and exciting. However, it slowly also becomes apparent that they will be left. This can be a daunting stage with separation, particularly if they are not used to change. This stage will pass and soon they will become confident and feel secure at their educator's/ kaiako home.

Here are a few tips that may help:

Start an activity

When you arrive each day help your child settle into an activity.

Saying goodbye

It is important to be honest with your child and tell them goodbye and that you are leaving but you will be back later to collect them. There may be a few tears, but often when parents are out of sight children will happily settle into an activity and start their day.

Be positive

If you are upset or worried, children can sense this and this can increase their anxiety. Try to encourage your child to look forward to their day and the fun they will have.

Schedule an early pick-up

On the first few days we recommend new families/whānau consider an earlier pick up time (about 30 minutes earlier than normal) as this is when new children can become anxious.

Feel free to text or phone the educator/kaiako during the day to find out how your child is. The educator/kaiako will also call you should your child continue to be upset and not able to settle.

Please be assured we are committed to ensuring this settling in time for your child is as enjoyable and easy as possible!



What to bring

Each day your child will need to bring:

- A bag with your child's name clearly printed
- A change of clothes (that you don't mind getting dirty)
- A sun hat in the summer months
- Healthy food/kai and a water bottle
- Nappies or pull-ups (if necessary)
- Any special comforts for sleep time
- Any other items that are part of your educator's/kaiako daily routine.

Please make sure to name all of your child's belongings.

Transportation

All families/whānau must provide their children's approved car seat to their educator/kaiako if any children are to be transported in the educator's/kaiako car.

Children and their families feel a sense of belonging.

Food and snacks

We promote healthy eating at home based education and encourage all families/whānau to send their children with nutritious healthy food. Please see examples below:

If your child has any food allergies, please notify the educator/kaiako.





Learning journals

Educators/nga kaiako maintain learning journals of children's experiences while in care. You and your child can access this whenever you wish and are welcome to take the journal home to share with your family/whānau. The learning journals detail children's interests, strengths, learning and development. The journals will form part of the basis to developing individualised learning programmes for each child.





The benefit for my family was that I could enrol my children in hours that fitted around our working days. Medical care

Sickness and accidents

If your child is sick or unable to attend home based education for any reason, please notify the educator/kaiako as soon as possible.

If your child is feeling unwell or displaying any of the symptoms below, we ask that they remain away from their home based education and return 48 hours after the final symptom clears. In particular, watch for:

- Vomiting and/or diarrhoea
- A high temperature
- An unidentified rash
- Conjunctivitis (unless medical treatment has been applied for at least 24 hours)
- Any other symptoms of a contagious illness
- Head lice (after treatment).

To stop sickness from spreading, it is important for you to keep your child at home when they are ill. How long they should be home depends on what sickness they have. If you are unsure about whether your child can attend, please phone your educator/kaiako first.

Medication

All medication requirements must be received in writing from the parent/guardian. Please ensure that medication is given to the educator/kaiako for safety. All medication must be labelled clearly with your child's name, method, dosage and when medicine is to be given.



Opening hours

Our hours vary per educator/kaiako so please discuss your needs directly with the home based team.




Going to kindergarten or school
